Draft Ecodesign and Energy Labelling Regulations 2021

This consultation sets out the government's intentions to:

- update ecodesign requirements for electric motors, household washing machines/washer-dryers, household dishwashers, household
- refrigeration and electronic displays
- introduce ecodesign requirements for welding equipment and commercial refrigeration
- introduce energy labelling requirements for commercial refrigeration

It includes:

- the ecodesign and energy labelling proposals themselves
- our assessment of the costs and benefits of these regulations, as set out in the consultation-stage Impact Assessments
- the intended timetables for reviewing the draft regulations after they come into force

The consultation is open to anyone but we anticipate it will be of particular interest to manufacturers, importers, trade bodies, consumer groups, environmental organisations and other civil society organisations, especially those with an interest in energy efficiency, resource efficiency, circular economy and climate change.

Following the consultation, we will consider whether revisions are needed to the draft regulations and will publish a final Impact Assessment alongside the final regulations. Opens: 30 September 2020

Local Air Quality Management Call for Evidence - Designation of Relevant Public Authorities The Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs has published a consultation on local air quality management.

This call for evidence seeks views on designation of Relevant Public Authorities under amendments to Part IV of the Environment Act 1995. Through the Environment Bill, we are amending the Environment Act 1995 to improve local collaboration by ensuring responsibility for tackling air pollution is shared amongst relevant parties. We intend to introduce a new power for the Secretary of State to designate Relevant Public Authorities who may then be required to act as ' Air Quality Partners' within the Local Air Quality Management (LAQM) Framework. " Air Quality Partners" may be required to co-operate with local authorities to reduce pollution levels where there are exceedances, or expected exceedances, of LAQM pollution limits. This new framework will result in all relevant authorities at local level taking effective, collaborative action to deliver air quality objectives.

Local air quality management: public authorities call for evidence

The Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs is seeking views and evidence on which public authorities should be considered for designation by the Environment Secretary as 'Relevant Public Authorities'. A relevant public authority may then be required to cooperate with local authorities acting as an 'Air Quality Partner' within the Local Air Quality Management Framework.

This is under a new power which we intend to introduce through the Environment Bill, amending Part IV of the Environment Act 1995.

In particular, we are looking to understand:

- the bodies' contribution to local air pollution
- the actions the bodies could realistically take to reduce the contribution in a local context
- the resource implications for the body

We welcome responses from local authorities and potential relevant public authorities. Opens: 5 October 2020

Achieving government's long-term environmental goals

The Public Accounts Select Committee has opened the inquiry, 'Achieving government's long-term environmental goals'. In January 2018, government published its 25 Year Environment Plan, setting out its ambition to improve the natural environment in England within a generation: both for the direct benefits this would bring, as well as to support its influence overseas and position the UK as a global environmental leader. The plan included ten overarching goals covering issues such as clean air, clean and plentiful water, and thriving plants and wildlife. This inquiry will investigate how government is organised to deliver its environmental goals, and maximising value-for-money. The Committee will question senior officials at the Cabinet Office, Department for the Environment, Food and Rural Affairs and the Environment Agency.

Improving Broadband

The Public Accounts Committee has opened a new inquiry looking into improving broadband.



Improving. In 2010, the government Broadband announced its aim for the UK to have the "best superfast broadband network in Europe", and set up the Superfast Programme to subsidise broadband roll out to areas where it is not commercially viable for providers to reach.

In a report published in mid-October, the NAO finds that despite wide coverage, many people in the UK still experience poor broadband. Suppliers to the Superfast Programme were encouraged to prioritise roll out to the easiest to reach premises, which means there is a risk that those in the most rural and remote locations will be left further behind. COVID-19: Government procurement

The Public Accounts Committee has opened the inquiry, 'COVID-19: Government procurement'.

COVID-19: Government procurement. In responding to the COVID-19 pandemic, public sector bodies have had to procure goods and services with extreme urgency. Under emergency laws brought in at the start of the pandemic crisis, the Cabinet Office - which oversees government's buying policies - has changed some of the procurement rules for contracts relating to the government's response to COVID-19. Concerns have been raised about some of these procurements, including around a lack of transparency. This inquiry will look at the scale of Government's COVID-19-related contracting, how procurement rules have changed and how the government is managing the risks associated with these changes. For a chosen sample of these contracts it will look specifically at who bought what, from whom, and at what cost, during the pandemic - and whether this is delivering value for taxpayers money in the crisis. The Committee will question senior officials at the Cabinet Office and Department for Health and Social Care.

COVID-19: Support for jobs

The House of Commons Public Accounts Committee has launched an inquiry into COVID-19 and support for jobs. In mid-November the Committee will question the most senior officials at the Treasury and HM Revenue & Customs (HMRC) in its latest inquiry into the Government's response to the Covid-19: this time on the programmes to support jobs during the pandemic. The Government implemented the Coronavirus Job Retention Scheme - widely known as the "furlough scheme" - and the Self Employment Income Support Scheme to help businesses and their employees, and the self-employed, cope with the COVID-19 pandemic. The combined value of these schemes is currently estimated to be around £75 billion. This inquiry is based on the latest in the NAO's programme of work on Covid-19, which considers HM Revenue & Customs' and HM Treasury's implementation of the schemes so far, including how they have been set-up and whether they have reached the groups intended The NAO's investigation will also report on how they are mitigating the risk of fraud in the schemes. In previous evidence to the Committee the Government has estimated fraud and error in the scheme may be as high as 10%.
